Questions 1-4: General experience and motivation

1. How and when did you first become involved in Cochrane and what has been your subsequent contribution to Cochrane's work (maximum 200 words)?

I have been involved with Cochrane since 2002 and completed my dissertation while at the Nordic Cochrane Centre. My interest in evidence-based medicine was sparked through lectures during my medical training at the University of Copenhagen and I now do my best to raise interest and awareness through training in Cochrane and EBM methods at both the pre- and postgraduate level.

In 2015, I became Deputy Director at the Nordic Cochrane Centre, which historically is one of the major Cochrane centres, and from 2018 to 2020 I was its Acting Director. With the outstanding team there, we helped ensure the funding and continued existence of the centre during some very difficult times.

In 2018, I was elected to the Board of the Cochrane Collaboration and have done my best to contribute to finding the best possible path forward for our organisation through this period of major transition for our organisation. Despite the considerable challenges we are facing, it has been a fantastic experience and privilege to serve on the Board.

I am currently involved in 20 Cochrane reviews at various stages.

2. What experience do you have serving as a member of a governing board, board of directors, management group or similar? Apart from my current term serving on the Cochrane Board, I have been a member of the Scientific Committee for the Preventing Overdiagnosis conference since 2018. I have also served on the Steering Committee for the Danish Society for Medical Ethics, Philosophy, and Methods since 2010, where I am the Treasurer. My main leadership roles have been as Deputy and Acting Director for the Nordic Cochrane Centre.

3. Acting as a Board member requires a collaborative approach to decision-making, setting aside personal opinions and group affiliations and acting in the best interests of the organization as a whole. Please describe how you would fulfil this obligation, using examples from previous committee or other work (maximum 200 words).

Despite the major challenges for our organization and the diversity of opinion among its members, I have experienced my past term on the Cochrane Board as highly collaborative. This can only be achieved if all members put the best interests of the organization and its overarching objectives first and are willing to compromise when necessary. The coming years for our organization will require the utmost of its Board in terms of not only skills and qualifications, but also in terms of making the best possible decisions when all viable options are difficult ones. As a Board member, a collaborative approach is crucial to enable that necessary but difficult decisions can be made and supported once they are to be implemented.

From 2018, the Nordic Cochrane Centre went through a very tumultuous time. Through collaboration with our Ministry of Health, an international evaluation committee, universities, and teaching hospitals, we were able to secure our funding and ability to continue our work with what our hearts are truly beating for: providing the best possible, independent evidence synthesis and methods development that we possibly can and enable evidence informed healthcare choices around the world.

4. What do you think would make you an effective member of the Cochrane Governing Board (maximum 200 words)?

Several of these changes have been needed for some time and the current Board have worked collectively and collaboratively to bring our organisation through this transition in the best possible position. We need new expertise and skills on the Board, but we also need to maintain momentum and direction in this ongoing process. Several important and highly qualified Board members are completing their terms, which means a number of Board members will be new. I would like to provide a bit of continuity amongst Board members and will be able to ensure that we remember where we came from and what we have been through so far.
